Oncology Takes a Multidisciplinary Care Team Approach to Build Market Distinctiveness

“While cancer mortality rates have declined due to innovative targeted treatments, new cancer incidence rates are expected to increase over the next 10+ years. Therefore, Premier Health needs to be positioned to accommodate our patient’s needs,” says Dr. Ouellette. Premier Health is laser-focused on its commitment

to developing and expanding its access to comprehensive cancer care services, clinical trials, and cancer prevention close to home.

How will we accomplish this? The oncology service line is launching specific cancer disease site teams using a multidisciplinary care team approach that includes cancer nurse navigators, social workers, genetic counselors, oncology pharmacists, pathology, marketing, therapy, operation leadership, primary care, and fellowship-trained cancer specialists. These teams are committed and energized to take a holistic, forward-looking approach and function as key influencers. How? By focusing on program growth ideas,

technology, marketing planning, quality, and operationalizing clinical pathway processes that strive to continually improve access to timely treatment and deliver a more seamless patient experience.

Here are a few examples of how the oncology service line has improved access for cancer patients this year:

- **Oncology Clinical Trials:** The oncology service line has expanded the clinical trials team to support the ongoing portfolio growth of oncology clinical trials and research. Premier Health is aligned with the National Cancer Institute (NCI) and members of ECOG-ACRIN, NRG, and GOG, and we offer industry-sponsored oncology trials. Kevin Harlan Named Atrium Medical Center's Next President



Kevin Harlan has been named president of Atrium Medical Center after

serving for the past two years at the helm of Upper Valley Medical Center.

Harlan served as UVMC's president through much of the COVID-19 pandemic. Despite that challenging public health emergency, the hospital strengthened its capabilities to enhance care to the community, achieving designations as a Level III trauma center and Level II cardiac cath lab and credentialing as a Primary Stroke Center. Under Harlan's leadership, UVMC earned an "A" from Leapfrog in 2021 and 2022; had a successful Joint Commission tri-annual survey that put UVMC in the top 10% of surveyed hospitals; and successfully completed multiple major construction projects, including a completely renovated Special Care Nursery supported by community fundraising.


Previously, Harlan led the Grand Lake Health System as president and CEO. He earned his associate degree in radiology from Sinclair College, a bachelor's degree in business and natural sciences from Wright State University, and a master's degree in business administration from Central Michigan University. He is a member of numerous professional health care and community organizations, including the Greater Dayton Area Hospital Association board and executive committee; Hospice of Miami County Board; development boards in Troy and Piqua; and The Hundred Club of Miami County. Harlan will serve as UVMC's interim president until his successor at that hospital is named.

Reminder: Flu and COVID Vaccines Available at CompuNet Locations

The 2022 flu vaccine and the newest Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 booster (bivalent, single dose shot) are now available at select CompuNet patient service centers.

Insurance will be billed for the COVID vaccine and the flu vaccine. If the patient does not carry insurance, there will be no out-of-pocket cost to the patient for the COVID vaccine; however, there will be an out-of-pocket cost for the flu vaccine. The self-pay prices for the flu vaccine are \$49.99 for the regular dose (under age 65) or \$94.99 for the high dose (ages 65 and older).

Improved Allergy Testing Options Available Through CompuNet

CompuNet has recently improved its allergy testing options. See below testing updates:

- Previously sent out to Quest Diagnostics, allergy tests are now performed in-house at the CompuNet core lab. Performing tests in-house typically results in improved turnaround times.
- Reference ranges for specific IgE allergens have been adjusted so that results now report down to as low as 0.10 kU/L.
- Additional allergens have been added to the allergy panels, including the Childhood Allergy panel, Nut Mix Allergy panel, Seafood Group Allergy panel, Food Allergy panel, and the Respiratory Allergy Profile, Region V panel.
